Bangladesh, often called the "Silent Victim" of climate change, has been battling the global environmental issue. The threats are increasing daily as the sea level rises, frequent extreme weather events are occurring, and changing weather patterns are more visible than ever. With multifaceted strategies, Bangladesh is pioneering innovative solutions to address the pressing challenges. Energy is closely linked to climate change as it serves as both a driver and a solution to the challenges posed by a warming planet. Climate-resilient energy supply, diversified energy mix including solar and wind, improved energy efficiency, and cross-border renewable energy trading are essential components to mitigate greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. Bridging Divides: Navigating the Complexities of India-Bangladesh Relations

This session will bring together diplomats, policy experts, and regional analysts to explore the key issues affecting India-Bangladesh relations, examine their implications for regional stability, and propose pathways for strengthened cooperation.

Key Discussion Points:

1. Border Management and Security Concerns:

Despite extensive efforts to manage the India-Bangladesh border, challenges persist in the form of illegal migration, smuggling, and trafficking. This session will examine how both nations can collaborate more effectively on border security while respecting the rights and livelihoods of local communities.

2. Water Sharing Disputes:

One of the most sensitive issues between the two countries is the sharing of transboundary rivers, particularly the Teesta River. Panelists will explore the dynamics of the water-sharing negotiations, the domestic pressures on both sides and the potential for innovative, equitable solutions to this longstanding issue.

3. Trade Imbalances and Economic Cooperation:

While economic ties between India and Bangladesh have grown, trade imbalances remain a source of tension. This discussion will focus on opportunities to enhance trade relations, reduce barriers, and foster more balanced economic cooperation, particularly in light of Bangladesh's emerging economic strength.

4. The Rohingya Refugee Crisis:

The influx of Rohingya refugees into Bangladesh from Myanmar has created a humanitarian crisis with implications for both Bangladesh and India. This session will

analyze the geopolitical ramifications of the crisis and how India and Bangladesh can collaborate to find sustainable solutions while managing their own security and economic concerns.

5. Cultural and Historical Bonds vs. Contemporary Politics:

India and Bangladesh share deep cultural and historical connections, but contemporary political realities can sometimes overshadow these ties. This session will explore how the two nations can leverage their shared history and culture to foster greater trust and understanding in their political and diplomatic engagements.

6. Climate Change and Environmental Cooperation:

Both India and Bangladesh are highly vulnerable to climate change, particularly in terms of rising sea levels and extreme weather events. Panelists will discuss opportunities for cross-border environmental cooperation, focusing on disaster management, climate resilience, and sustainable development.

As SAARC struggles to meet its goals due to political obstacles, the region is looking toward alternative cooperation models. This plenary session will dive into the structural and political roadblocks that have limited SAARC's impact, exploring the organization's potential to remain relevant in a rapidly changing geopolitical landscape. As South Asia's population grapples with common issues, including climate-induced disasters, cross-border migration, and poverty alleviation, panelists will assess the future of SAARC and ask critical questions: Can SAARC be revitalized, or is it time to shift focus toward alternative frameworks for collaboration? How can South Asia strengthen regional unity in an environment marked by national interests and unresolved conflicts? Panelists will also explore the role of track 2 diplomacy, using examples like cross-border environmental dialogues in the Himalayas, to reduce friction and identify opportunities for collective growth, ensuring that cooperation is achievable even in a fractured South Asia.
